1. **Military General Service Medal 1848**, four clasps, Corunna, Salamanca, Orthes, and Toulouse, named to M. Donoghue, 42nd Foot. Michael Donoghue, born Kiimain, Cork., Served 20th January 1795 to 20th August 1802 in Loyal Inverness Fencible Highlanders. Re-enlisted in 42nd at Balana, 7th September 1806 for 7 years. Joined 1st Battalion, stationed at Gibraltar, March 1808, present at Corruna, 16th January 1809, Embarked with Battalion for England, 19th January 1809. Left sick at Canterbury, and in Hospital when Battalion embarked for Walcheren Expedition, 16th July 1809. Rejoined Battalion at Musselburgh on its return to England, 17th July 1810. Arrived in Portugal with Battalion, 29th April 1812. Left sick at Penasanda, June 1812, but rejoined Battalion for Salamanca 22nd July 1812, re-enlisted in March 1813. Sick during December 1813, but rejoined for Orthes 27th February 1813, and Toulouse 10th April 1814. Returned with Battalion from France, embarking 21st June 1814 at Bordeaux. Service with Battalion in Ireland at Kilkenny, until it embarked for Flanders, served with Battalion in Ireland at Kilkenny, until it embarked for Flanders, 9th May 1815, when left sick with Depot at Cork. Rejoined Battalion at Edinburgh, on its return from France 8th March 1816, and transferred to 3rd Royal Veteran Battalion stationed at Edinburgh, which disbanded in May/July 1816. *Nearly extremely fine* £1,700-2,000
 2. **Afghanistan Medal 1842**, reverse Candahar, Ghuznee and Cabul 1842, unnamed as issued. *Good very fine* £375-425
 3. **Baltic Medal**, with replacement loop suspender (see images), unnamed as issued. *Generally very fine* £60-80
 4. **Crimea Medal**, clasp Sebastopol, officially impressed to **R. SANDFORD, 57th REGT.** With original ribbon. **Sold** together with digital copies of **Census returns**; digital copies of his **British Army Service papers**; digital photographs of some **Muster Roll entries**; digital copies of **Medal Rolls**; digital copies of **Discharge records** and digital copy of **Marriage certificate**. **Robert Sandford** was born in Holkham, Wells, Norfolk during 1828, the son of John and May Sandford. Whilst an 18 year old Labourer, he attested to join the **57th (West Middlesex) Regiment**, at Little Walshingham, Norfolk on 9th May, 1846. **1922 Private Sandford** was tried by **Regimental Court Martial** on 6th February, 1851, for **drunkenness and making his escape**. **Sandford was sentenced to 21 days imprisonment with Hard Labour**. He served abroad in **Corfu** for 2 years and 7 months; **Malta** for 1 month; and with the **Expeditionary Army in the East (Crimea)** for 5 months. Sandford was discharged, at Chatham, Kent, on 14th October, 1856, after serving 10 Years 93 days. He had been found unfit for further service owing to poor eye sight. The vision in his right eye was impaired by **sand being blown into the eye whilst on service in the Crimea during October, 1855**. Robert married Jemina Thompson at Warham by the Sea, North Norfolk, on 23rd October, 1856. By 1861, he was an Agricultural Labourer living on the Road to Wells, Norfolk with his Wife and 2 children.  5. **Crimea Medal**, no clasp, named in engraved style (see images) to H. Walker, Ry Albert. Mounted for display. Some contact wear, *Very fine* £60-80
 6. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Umbeyla named to 338 M. Ford, H.M. 1st Battalion, 7th Regiment. With copy medal roll, *Good very fine* £210-250
 7. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Central India named to Robert Kirwan, 83rd Regiment. Suspender loose, needs re-pinning (you can currently slide it around the disc). *Generally very fine* £360-400
 8. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no clasp, impressed CORPL Wm GREAVES, 37th REGT. With original ribbon. **Sold** together with digital copies of **Census returns**; digital copies of **marriage certificates**; digital photographs of **Muster Roll entries**; digital copies of **Pension details**; digital copy of **Death Certificate**; digital copy of **Probate Calendar entry**; and digital photograph of his **Grave**. William Greaves was born, in Repton, Derbyshire, on 24th December, 1835, the son of Joseph Greaves, a basket maker, and Hannah Greaves. By 1851, He was an agricultural labourer working on a 121 acre farm at Burnaston, Derbyshire. William enlisted in the **37th (North Hampshire) Regiment**, at Liverpool, on 19th September, 1857. **42 Private Greaves, 37th (North Hampshire) Regiment**, was transferred on 12th January, 1858, from the Regimental Depot, at Colchester, to the Service Companies in India, seeing active service during the **Indian Mutiny**. By 1861, he had been promoted to **Corporal**, stationed at Raglan Barracks, Plymouth. William married Eliza Henderson, at the Stoke Damerel Parish Church in Devon, on 25th September, 1861. Sergeant Greaves was transferred to the **unattached list – Barrack Department** on 9th May, 1870. **Barrack Sergeant William Greaves**, a widower, married Margaret McGovern, at Bareilly, India, on 24th April, 1874. He was awarded the **Army Long Service and Good Conduct Medal** on 24th November, 1876 receiving the LSGC gratuity on 12th March, 1877. William was appointed **Sub Conductor** on 7th May, 1883. **Sub Conductor Greaves, Military Works Department**, was “invalided” on 27th February, 1885, with a pension of £72.0.0 per Annum. He had served 21 years 88 days in India and 6 years 76 days in England. Of this service 12 years 47 days was Regimental service and 15 years 117 days was Departmental service. William Greaves died on 3rd December, 1900 in Gisborne Street, Derby. Edge-knocks and a few scratches to the Queen’s face, *Nearly extremely fine* £285-325
 9. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no clasp to Drummer D. McGuire, 29th Regiment. Daniel McGuire was born in Waterford, County Waterford, Ireland, and attested for service with the British Army at Edinburgh on 21st August 1841 when aged 14, joining as a Private (No.1575) the 29th Worcestershire Regiment of Foot. McGuire went on to serve for 21 years, of which 17 years and 1 month was spent overseas, being sent for garrison duty in Mauritius in 1842, and then on to India, where he was present during the First Sikh War

in the Sutlej Campaign of 1845 to 1846, being present in action at the battle of Ferozeshuhur from 21st to 22nd December 1845, and then battle of Sobraon on 10th February 1846, where his regiment suffered 186 casualties out of 552 men present, followed by the Second Sikh War in the Punjab Campaign of 1848 to 1849, where he was present in action at the battle of Chilianwala on 13th January 1849, and the battle of Goojerat on 21st February 1849. Ten days later the regiment was with the force which occupied Lahore thus ending the war. McGuire then saw service during the Indian Mutiny, his regiment having been in fact garrisoned in Burma for most of the mutiny, however some 326 men were used to keep open the Grand Trunk Road during the mutiny, and McGuire was one of these men who formed the detachment given this task, as a result of which he received the medal. During his career, McGuire had originally been promoted to Drummer back on 1st April 1842, but reverted to Private on 14th October 1843, and was then appointed to Drummer again on 8th May 1844. Promoted to Corporal on 1st March 1851, he was then tried by Regimental Court Martial on 2nd July 1851, being convicted of drunkenness, and sentenced to be reduced to the ranks and to thirty days imprisonment. Once again appointed to Drummer on 22nd July 1851, he then once again tried by Regimental Court Martial and sentence to forty days imprisonment for drunkenness on 17th May 1854, though his sentence was remitted on 7th June 1854, and he then continued as a Drummer for the remainder of his career. His pension records also state that he served as a Trumpeter for 10 years of his service, and was discharged on 31st October 1865. *Good very fine* £280-330

10. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Lucknow, named to Hy Jenkins, 97th Foot. Henry Jenkins, with copy medal roll, confirming entitlement to Lucknow clasp. Medal has been made into a menu holder, please see website photographs. Some contact wear, and edge-bruising, *Very fine* £225-275
11. **Abyssinia Medal**, reverse named in correct embossed style to 676 Corporal J. Charleston, 26th Regiment. 26th Regiment was the Cameronians. With copy service papers from Alloa in Clackmannanshire. Generally very fine £275-325
12. **Canada General Service Medal**, clasp Fenian Raid 1866, named to 1428 Private J. d, 4th Rifle Brigade. Only 175 such medals to the Regiment, unresearched. *Nearly extremely fine* £460-500
13. **Afghanistan Medal 1878**, clasp Ahmed Khel to 1035 Private J. Anderson, 59th Foot. (2nd Nottinghamshires). *Good very fine* £270-320
14. **Egypt Medal**, dated reverse, three clasps, Tel-El-Kebir, Suakin 1884 and El-Teb_Tamaai named to 1111 Private P. Keegan, 1st Gordon Highlanders. With research, Keegan was regularly imprisoned during his service usually for Drunkenness, from Kildare, Ireland, he enlisted in the British Army, 8th December 1862, discharged 29th December 1885. Some light pitting, presumably from a Khedives Star, thus *Generally very fine* £360-400
15. **Khedives Star**, dated 1884-6, unnamed as issued. *Generally very fine* £30-40
16. **Khedives Star**, dated 1882, suspender missing, unnamed as issued. *Very fine* £20-30
17. **India General Service Medal 1895**, VR, clasp Punjab Frontier 1897-98 named to Assistant Surgeon E. De Roche, Indian Staff Medical Department. *Good very fine* £190-240
18. **India General Service Medal 1895**, clasp Relief of Chitral 1895 to 3560 Private P. McFadyan, 2nd Battalion, Kings Own Scottish Borderers. *Very fine* £180-220
19. **Queens South Africa Medal**, four clasps, Cape Colony, Orange Free State, Transvaal and South Africa 1902 named to 4573 Corporal W. Ramm, Essex Regiment. With copy Medal roll confirming clasps, served with 3rd Battalion. *Good very fine* £110-140
20. **Queens South Africa Medal**, three clasps, Cape Colony, Transvaal, South Africa 1901 to Major C.L. Robinson, Lancashire Fusiliers. Charles Lawson Robinson was the son of Robert Robinson, of Howlish Hall, Bishop Auckland, County Durham, and served in South Africa during the Boer War on operations in the Cape Colony and Transvaal during 1900 and 1901. It is likely that Robinson came out to South Africa and joined the 2nd Battalion as a replacement for the large number of casualties suffered by the Battalion at Spion Kop during the relief of Ladysmith on 23rd February 1900. The 2nd Battalion was decimated but nevertheless made it's name in this action. When General Buller moved into the Transvaal the Vth Division remained about the railway, and then operated in the south-east of that country, the Utrecht-Vryheid district, and frequently saw tough fighting. The Mounted Infantry of the Lancashire Fusiliers formed part of the garrison of Vryheid when that town was attacked on 10th-11th December 1900. After very severe fighting the enemy was driven off with a loss of 100 killed and wounded. The men of the battalion had about 10 casualties. At Fort Itala on 26th September 1901 the 2nd Lancashire Fusiliers were represented in the little force which made one of the finest stands recorded in the campaign. One man of the battalion was killed and 5 wounded. In January 1901 the battalion entrained at Dundee for the Pretoria district. On arriving about Elandsfontein five companies were put into the column of Colonel Allenby, and three companies, under Major Tidswell, into the column of Colonel E C Knox; these columns being two of those then commencing the great sweep under General French to the Piet Retief district. In the beginning of May the battalion got together again at Middelburg and relieved the 2nd Berkshire Regiment on the railway line. Headquarters were at Wonderfontein. The battalion remained in the Eastern Transvaal till peace was declared. Robinson's Queen's South Africa Medal 1899-1902 with three clasps for Cape Colony, the Transvaal, and South Africa 1901 was issued at Aldershot on 15th July 1903, and sent to him at the Regimental Depot. Robinson had retired as an Honorary Colonel with the Special Reserve by the outbreak of the Great War, and was recalled for service as a Lieutenant Colonel, and saw service with the 1st Battalion, Monmouthshire Regiment in France from 15th February 1915 being then killed in action at Ypres on 8th May 1915 when aged 45. Having no known grave he is commemorated by name on the Ypres Menin Gate Memorial. *Nearly extremely fine* £500-600
21. **Queens South Africa Medal**, four clasps, Tugela Heights, Orange Free State, Relief of Ladysmith and Laing's Nek, impressed 3320 Pte C.J. ACOURT, 2nd E. SURREY REGT. **Sold** together with a digital copy of his **Baptism record**; digital copies of **Census returns**; digital of copies of **British Army Service papers (Victorian & WW1)**; digital copy of **Medal roll**; digital copy of **Marriage entry**; digital copies of **Newspaper entries**; and a digital copy of his **GPO employment register entry**. **Charles John Acourt** was born on 27th November, 1869, in St.Pancras, London, the son of Elisha Acourt (shown as Thomas Acourt on his Military Records) and Agnes Acourt. He was baptised on 20th December, 1869 at the Old Church, St Pancras, London. Charles Acourt, a labourer, enlisted in the **East Surrey Regiment** on 20th January, 1891. He was already serving in the **7th Battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps**. Acourt was posted to the **2nd Battalion, East Surrey Regiment** on 26th February, 1891 transferring to the **1st**

Battalion on 26th September, 1892 stationed in the East Indies. He was transferred to the **Army Reserve** on 29th January, 1899. Charles Acourt was **recalled for war service** on 7th October, 1899, and **embarked for South Africa with the 2nd Battalion, East Surrey Regiment**. They arrived on 20th October, 1899 for service during the **second Anglo-Boer War**. **3320 Private C Acourt, 2nd Battalion, East Surrey Regiment was wounded in action, during the attempts to relieve Ladysmith, at Almonds Nek (Allemands Nek) on 14th June, 1900** and he was returned to the United Kingdom on 20th October, 1900. **Private Acourt** was transferred to the **Army Reserve** on 30th April, 1902. Charles married Mary Margaret Sheppard on 26th December, 1902 at St Thomas's Church, Finsbury Park, London. He was finally **discharged from the Army Reserve**, at Kingston on Thames, on 16th January, 1903, after 12 years' service. His character was very good and was in possession of two Good conduct Badges. In 1911, Charles was a **Post Office Labourer**, living with his wife and children, in the Bloomfield Road, Bow, London. With the outbreak of WW1, Charles A'court was an **engineering workman**, still living in the Bloomfield Road, Bow, London. **He was re called for service with the Colours, as an ex-Soldier, under the Military Services Act, 1916** on 24th April, 1918. Charles confirmed his previous service with the **East Surrey Regiment** and having been discharged on 16th January, 1903. **329695 Pioneer C J A'Court, Royal Engineers, Signal Service** was called up on 2nd July, 1918, but was transferred to the **W Reserve** the following day. Charles was **discharged, being surplus to Military requirements and without overseas service**, on 14th December, 1918. **He was not entitled to any WW1 medals**. He re - joined the General Post Office, as a skilled workman, Engineering London, during 1920. Charles John Acourt died in Stepney, London, during 1936. Records show him as Acourt and A'court. Ghost dates, *Nearly extremely fine* £200-240

22. **Queens South Africa Medal**, three clasps, Cape Colony, Orange Free State, South Africa 1902 to 6237 Drummer G. Arnold, Royal Dublin Fusiliers. George Arnold was born in Farnham, Hampshire, and having worked as a musician, then attested for service with the British Army when aged 15 at Gosport on 10th January 1898, and joining as a Boy (No.6237) with the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. Posted to the 4th Battalion as a Boy Soldier, he was ranked as a Drummer from 12th January 1898, and saw service in South Africa with the 1st Battalion from 27th March to 3rd October 1902, being present on operations during the Boer War in the Cape Colony and the Orange Free State. Posted to Malta from 24th September 1903 to 15th November 1905, and to Egypt from 16th November 1905 to 12th October 1907, and the Sudan from 13th October 1907 to 14th October 1908 before returning to Egypt from 15th October 1908 to 8th October 1909, he transferred to the 2nd Battalion on 25th September 1909, and was then posted home and discharged on 9th January 1910. *Good very fine* £200-250
23. **Queens South Africa Medal**, three clasps, Cape Colony, Tugela Heights and Relief of Ladysmith named to 2461 Private C. Robbins, Somerset Light Infantry. Died of Disease on 5th April 1900 at Chieveley, whilst with 2nd Battalion, Somerset Light Infantry. *Good very fine* £150-200
24. **Queens South Africa Medal**, five clasps, Cape Colony, Orange Free State, Transvaal, South Africa 1901 and South Africa 1902, named to 4675 Private A.H. Parker, 7th Hussars. With research confirming clasp entitlement. *Good very fine* £130-170
25. **Queens South Africa Medal**, four clasps, Cape Colony, Tugela Heights, Relief of Ladysmith and Transvaal to 3166 Private R. Leyburn, 2nd Royal Scots Fusiliers. *Good very fine* £130-160
26. **Queens South Africa Medal**, four clasps, Cape Colony, Orange Free State, Transvaal and South Africa 1902 to 2904 Private J. Crocker, Scots Guards. Suspender loose, *Very fine* £130-160
27. **Queens South Africa Medal**, three clasps, Cape Colony, Orange Free State and Transvaal named to 3157 Private J. Maginnis, Royal Irish Rifles. Faint ghost dates to reverse, *Nearly extremely fine* £125-150
28. **Queens South Africa Medal**, two clasps, Natal and Belfast named to 3372 Private J.E.H. Grain, 5th Lancers. With copy medal roll. *Nearly extremely fine* £175-225
29. **Queens South Africa Medal**, two clasps, Cape Colony and Orange Free State named to 3161 Private J. McCreanor, Royal Irish Rifles. *Good very fine* £110-140
30. **Queens South Africa Medal**, two clasps, Cape Colony and Transvaal named to 3553 Private J. Fitzsimmons, Liverpool Regiment. With copy medal roll, served with 4th Battalion. Clasps loose on ribbon. Toned, *Good very fine* £75-95
31. **Queens South Africa Medal**, disc only, no clasp, named to 1280 Trooper C. Bailey, Imperial Light Horse. There has been a hole drilled through the medal just under the suspender. *Poor condition* £20-25
32. **Queens South Africa Medal**, no clasp to Private I. Vorster, Burghersdorp Town Guard. Awarded to Private I. Vorster, Burghersdorp Town Guard, who saw service during the Boer War. 205 medals awarded to unit. *Good very fine* £130-160
33. **Queens South Africa Medal**, no clasp named to 674 Private T. Young, Uitenhage Town Guard. Toned, *Nearly extremely fine* £90-110
34. **Kings South Africa Medal**, two clasps, South Africa 1901 and South Africa 1902 named to 5267 Private G. Cranfield, Essex Regiment. Replacement suspender, *Generally very fine* £60-80
35. **Tibet Medal**, in bronze, clasp Gyantse named to Cook Nanku, 24th Punjabis. *Nearly extremely fine* £260-300
36. **India General Service Medal 1908**, Ed VII, clasp North West Frontier 1908 named to 2265 Sepoy Asa Singh, 54th Sikhs. *Generally very fine* £50-60
37. **Naval General Service Medal 1915**, Geo V, clasp Persian Gulf 1909-1914 to PLY.7838 Private R. McLaughlin, Royal Marine Light Infantry, HMS Fox. *Good very fine* £140-170
38. **1914 Star**, impressed 10863 PTE J. CALDER, 1/6 GORD: HIGHRS. **Wounded in action 4 times before being Killed in action.** Sold together with digital copies of **Newspaper entries/Casualty lists**; digital copy of **Medal Index Card**; digital copy of **Medal**

Roll: digital copy of **Register of Soldier's Effects entry; Commonwealth War Graves Commission records** and digital copy of the **1/4th Battalion, Gordon Highlanders War Diary for April, 1918**. John Calder was born in Buckie, Banffshire, Scotland, during 1888, the son of Mrs. M Calder, of 4 St. Peter's Road, Buckie, Scotland. A Stevedore employed by Messrs McWilliam, Coal Merchant, John enlisted in the **1/6th (Banff and Donside) Battalion, Gordon Highlanders, Territorial Force**, at Keith, Banffshire. 10863 Private John Calder, landed at Le Harve, France, with "D" Company, 1/6th (Banff and Donside) Battalion, Gordon Highlanders, on 10th November, 1914. John was reported as being **Wounded in Action (during the Battle of Loos)** in the **Daily Casualty List of the 16th October, 1915** (Published on 26th October, 1915). He was reported as being **Wounded in Action for a second time, (during the Battle of the Somme – probably at High Wood)** in the **Daily Casualty List published in the "Times" on 1st September, 1916**. Calder was renumbered 265616 during February, 1917. John was further reported as being **Wounded in Action (during the Third Battle for Ypres)** in the **Daily Casualty List of 11th August, 1917** (published 14th October, 1917) and was **Wounded in Action (during the Third Battle for Ypres), for a fourth time**, shown in the **Casualty List of 18th October, 1917** (Published on 23rd October, 1917). He was later transferred to the **1/4th Battalion, Gordon Highlanders** and **Killed in Action on 12th April, 1918, (during the Battle of the Lys)**. Lance Corporal John Calder is commemorated on the Ploegsteert Memorial, Belgium and the Scottish National War Memorial, Edinburgh. He was also entitled to the British War Medal and Victory Medal.

39. **1914 Star**, with 5th Aug-22nd Nov bar, named to 8463 Private M. Tresadern, 1st Northumberland Fusiliers. *Generally very fine* £60-80
40. **1914 Star** named to 78838 Driver F. Martin, Royal Horse Artillery. *Good very fine* £40-50
41. **1914-15 Star**, impressed **PTE H.M.CLAYTON, BRANDS F.S.RFLS Sold** together with digital copy of **Baptism record**; digital copies of **Census returns**; and digital copies of **South African Military Records**. **Harry Mitchell Clayton** was born in Clerkenwell, Middlesex on 25th September, 1876, the son of Joseph and Sarah Clayton. He immigrated to South Africa and worked as a Tailor. With the outbreak of Great War in August, 1914, he joined the **1st Regiment, 5th Mounted Brigade (also known as Brand's Free State Rifles)** and served in the **German South West Africa Campaign**. He later enlisted in the **2nd South Africa Infantry** and numbered 4714 and served in **France and Flanders**. **Private Clayton**, originally of **E Company, 2nd South Africa Infantry**, was transferred to **C Company** on 20th January, 1916 and then to **D Company** on 8th June, 1916. **Private Clayton** was admitted to the **6th General Hospital, Rouen, France** on 28th July, 1916 classified as **NYD (Not Yet Diagnosed)**. He was returned to Britain on 1st August, 1916 suffering from Locomotor ataxia and he was admitted to the **Ulster Volunteer Force Hospital, Belfast** on 4th August, 1916. He proceeded overseas, to France and Flanders, and taken on strength of **F Company, 2nd South Africa Infantry** on 4th November, 1916. **4714 Private Clayton** sailed for South Africa on board the **SS Durban Castle** arriving at Cape Town on 12th April, 1918. He was discharged at Wynberg, Cape Town, South Africa on 30th April, 1918 being permanently unfit for General War Service. His intended to reside at Boys Street, Harrismith, South Africa. *Extremely fine* £40-50
42. **1914-15 Star** named to 12405 Private W. Burchall, Lancashire Fusiliers. *Generally very fine* £30-35
43. **1914-15 Star** named to 1891 Private W.S. King, Essex Regiment. *Good very fine* £30-35
44. **1914-15 Star** named to 9975 Private F. Collins, Middlesex Regiment. *Nearly extremely fine* £20-25
45. **1914-15 Star** named to 22037 Private T. Young, Royal Army Medical Corps. *Good very fine* £18-22
46. **1914-15 Star**, named to 50297 Pioneer A. Pearce, Royal Engineers. With copy Medal index card, entered the Balkans on 25th July 1915 and is entitled to a 1915 Star Trio. *Generally very fine* £18-22
47. **1914-15 Star** named to T4-107814 Private J.H. Kemp, Army Service Corps. *Generally very fine* £18-22
48. **British War Medal** named to Lieutenant W.J. Norris. Lieutenant William John Norris, Manchester Regiment, died 14th October 1918 and is buried at Mont-Huon Military Cemetery. *Good very fine* £75-95

192. **Commander W.H. Eyre, Royal Navy, a Veteran of the Egyptian campaign and later Boom Defence during the Great War. Egypt Medal**, reverse dated 1882, no clasp; to Sub Lieutenant W.H. Eyre, Royal Navy, HMS Euryalus. **British War Medal** to Commander W.H. Eyre, Royal Navy. **Jubilee Medal 1897** in Silver; **Khedives Star** dated 1882. William Henry Eyre was born on 2nd May 1860 and entered the Royal Navy on 15th July 1873, before passing out of the Royal Naval College as a Sub Lieutenant on 14th July 1880, and having passed in gunnery on 1st April 1881, was then posted to the ironclad battleship H.M.S. Northumberland from 10th May 1881, was posted aboard the iron screw corvette H.M.S. Euryalus from 1st January 1882, being present for her recommissioning, he was then aboard her in the operations on and off the coast of Egypt during 1882, service which gained him the Egypt and Sudan Medal 1882-1889, reverse dated 1882, without clasp, and the Khedive's Star dated 1882. Eyre was promoted to Lieutenant on 30th June 1884 by which time he was serving with the training ship Ganges and as an additional for the 8 gun brig H.M.S. Sealark, and from 12th November 1884 was posted aboard the battleship H.M.S. Audacious, followed by service aboard the following: the battleship H.M.S. Agamemnon from 10th August 1885; and then received a posting to Torpedo Boat No.44 from 12th May 1886, serving in command, before being posted to the battleship H.M.S. Colossus from 12th July 1888, and after various gunnery courses, was then posted aboard the troop ship H.M.S. Euphrates from 23rd August 1893, and having been promoted in the rank of Lieutenant Commander to the sail training brig H.M.S. Wanderer and placed in command, was then awarded the Jubilee Medal 1897 in Silver whilst in this posting, and after charges of misbehaving with contempt to a senior officer on 21st June 1898, his career appears to have not shone any further, and he was placed on the Retired List in the rank of Commander on 27th March 1905. With the outbreak of the Great War, he was recalled for service in the rank of Commander, and saw service at home on Boom Defence Work, being then promoted to Captain 'for war services' on 11th November 1918, and once again placed on the Retired List in the rank of Captain on 31st March 1919, and died on 21st September 1934. 194. **The intriguing Sudan 1884 pair awarded to Boy 1st Class C.H. Croydon, Royal Navy, who served as a Bugler aboard the sloop H.M.S Dryad, and was one of 99 men who served aboard her and receive the undated medal without clasp, despite apparently personally claiming entitlement to the El-Teb clasp, and adding an unofficial clasp reading ‘Tam Neil’, and then claiming duplicates in 1894, Egypt 1882,** undated reverse, clasp: El-Teb, together with an attached unofficial clasp reading: Tam Neil, both clasps loose on ribbon, named in correct impressed style found on the undated medals to C.H. Croydon, Boy 1st Class, HMS Dryad. **Khedives Star** dated 1884-6, unnamed as issued. Both with original old ribbons. Charles Henry Croydon was born on 21st September 1866 in Windsor, Berkshire, and joined the Royal Navy as a Boy 2nd Class (No.120085) with Boscawen on 9th June 1882, being advanced to Boy 1st Class on 20th June 1883. Posted to the training ship St Vincent on 7th July 1883, he qualified as a Bugler on 1st October 1883, he then joined the sloop H.M.S Dryad on 2nd December 1883. Commander Edward Grey Hulton took command in January 1884, and under his command some of her ship's company formed part of the Naval Brigade which accompanied the army under General Sir Gerald Graham. The Naval contingent consisted of 150 seamen and 400 Royal Marines. They came from a number of ships lying off Suakin which joined others at Trinkitat to offload the Expeditionary Force. After marching inland, the Brigade took part in the battle of El Teb. It was at this battle that Captain Arthur Knyvet Wilson of HMS Hecla earned the Victoria Cross for his conspicuous bravery in fighting with his fists, and saving one corner of the British square from being broken. After the battle of El Teb, the General Commanding issued a general order in which he especially thanked the Naval Brigade for their cheerful endurance during the severe work of dragging the guns over difficult country, and for their ready gallantry and steadiness under fire. On 11 March, the Naval Brigade advanced from Suakin with the troops for the dispersal of the Arab forces who were beleaguering Sinkat. On 12 March, the expeditionary force took part in the Battle of Tamaai. The Naval Brigade charged the Arabs, was surrounded, and lost their guns. Order was at length restored, and the Naval Brigade, advancing again, had the satisfaction of regaining all their guns; the Arab forces retired after suffering a loss of 2,000 killed. The total British loss was 109 killed and 104 wounded, of which the Naval Brigade lost 3 officers and 7 men killed, and 1 officer and 6 seamen wounded. Among the killed was Lieutenant Houston Stewart of Dryad, who died while defending the guns. Croydon who was serving as a Boy 1st Class and Bugler, and was present with Dryad aboard ship at Suakin in the Sudan, however he was not apparently part of the Naval Brigade, and did not see service ashore in any form, specifically at the battle of El Teb on 29th February 1884, when only two men were present from Dryad solely for this action, out of the 150 officers and ratings and 400 marines present in this action with the Naval Brigade, according to British Battles and Medals. Some 220 men of Dryad were present for both the El Teb battle, and the subsequent battle of Tamaai on 13th March 1885, and these 220 men qualified for the El-Teb_Tamaai clasp, not the single clasps El-Teb and for Tamaai, only 5 men from Dryad solely qualified for this clasp. The presence of the jeweller's clasp reading ‘Tam Neil’ can only be explained as referring to the Tamaai clasp, which presumably the recipient or jeweller mistook the name of, and hence it is possible that Croydon, added these clasps later, there being no evidence of his entitlement, or of his being present at the battle of Tamaai on 13th March 1885, and / or the battle of Tamaai on 13th March 1885. He may well have issued himself with the clasp for El Teb, and subsequently realised the possibility of adding entitlement for Tamaai, and then, with an original clasp not being available, and the lack of knowledge of the actual correct name of the action, or the fact that 220 men of his boat actually qualified for the El-Teb_Tamaai clasp, then got the jeweller to make one up reading ‘Tam Neil’. What is shown on the rolls is that Croydon who was serving with aboard Dryad as a Boy 1st Class and Bugler, was issued with the Egypt Medal 1882-1889 with undated reverse, but that no clasp was issued, when the medal was sent to him on 5th February 1885. He is one of 99 men of Dryad who received the medal undated without clasp. A further note states that Croydon then received duplicates sent to him on 12th January 1894. Again no mention is made of entitlement to clasp or clasps. The final evidence to suggest his lack of awareness of the existence of the El-Teb_Tamaai clasp to 220 men of Dryad, is the fact that he was in fact discharged prior to the issue of his medals, a hence would not have been around fellow crewmen and veterans of both the actions to notice the error. Croydon was himself posted home to the Devonport depot ship Royal Adelaide on 17th June 1884, and then invalidated ashore and out of the service on 3rd October 1884, with as mentioned his original medals being issued to him on 5th February 1885. The existence of the note ‘duplicates sent to party 12/1/94’ would indicate that he then claimed for lost / stolen or disposed of medals, his original issues. The medals being sold above would appear to be his original issues however, as the impressed naming matches that found on the undated Egypt Medal issued to the Royal Navy of the period of first issue, though there is only ten years difference between the first issue and re-issue. Intriguingly is the image of a faintly etched ‘S’ on the obverse of the first medal to the left of the Queen's neck, this may well reflect the word ‘stolen’ or else ‘sold’, and was put on at the time of discovery or else via the pawnbroker to whom these may have come into the hands of. both clasps loose on ribbon on first, second a jewellers unofficial example, the image of a faintly etched ‘S’ on the obverse of the first medal to the left of the Queen's neck, some contact wear, overall *Very Fine.* £390-440

In March, 1897, he joined the **Great Western Railway,** at the Birmingham Goods yard as a Lorry Boy, receiving 9 shillings a week. On the 11th April, 1898, his wages were increased to 11 shillings a week. He resigned in November, 1898. Frederick attested in the **5th (Militia) Battalion, Royal Warwickshire Regiment,** in Birmingham, on 31st January, 1899. On enlistment, he was working for

Pickford and Co, Curzon Street, Birmingham. **7162 Private Frederick Dews, Royal Warwickshire Regiment, attested to join the West Yorkshire Regiment, in Birmingham, on 17th August, 1899.** 5299 Corporal Dews served in South Africa during the **Anglo-Boer War** with the **2nd Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment**, as well as being attached to the **4th Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment**. He married Annie Corbett in Birmingham on 12th October, 1907 at St George's Parish Church, Birmingham. Annie died in Aston district during 1910. By the 1911 Census, Frederick, a widower, was working as a thread maker in a rubber works. With the outbreak of war in August, 1914, Dews volunteered for service with the **11th (Service) Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment**. He married Elizabeth Susan Kathleen Creaner, in Elham, Kent, during April, 1915. **5299 Company Sergeant Major Frederick Dews** landed in France on 26th August, 1915. **Company Sergeant Major Dews was Mentioned in Despatches in the London Gazette dated 15th June, 1916.** **5229 Acting Regimental Sergeant Major Frederick Dews** was reported as **Missing on 20th September, 1916**, (Times Newspaper 30th October, 1916) whilst the Battalion was holding the **Push Alley; Gunpit Road and Factory Lane Trenches at Martinpuich, Somme, France**. **R.S.M. Dews** was confirmed as having been **Killed in Action** on 20th September, 1916 in the **Daily Casualty List** of 16th November 1916. Originally buried on the battlefield, his body was exhumed and buried in the **Adanac Military Cemetery, Courcellette, Somme, France**. Mohan was slightly wounded by gunshot on 5th April 1916 whilst in the trenches at Hannah during the first attack on Turkish positions at the Orah canal. At 5 am on the 5th April, the King's Own successfully drove the enemy out of its front line trench "at the point of the bayonet" with very few casualties. 12 hours later, the Battalion was back in action again, capturing a further three enemy trenches. Mohan was then reported as missing in action on 9th April 1916 at Sannaujat. On 9th April 1916 the King's Own attacked again at 4.20 am on the enemy positions at Sannaujat. The Turkish troops were prepared for an assault and sent up flares. This enabled them to keep up accurate rifle and machine gun fire until 8 am. The attack was a failure, with 12 killed, 89 wounded and 91 missing. Mohan who was reported as missing in action on 9th April 1916, was then assumed for official purposes to have been killed in action as of 11th April 1916. He was clearly killed in action back on 9th April 1916, being most probably shot down in no man's land. Having no known grave, he is commemorated by name on the Basra Memorial. During WW2 he was acting Consul General at Buenos Aires, Argentina from October 1942, being appointed Consul General on 9th May 1944, being award the CBE, Civil, on 1st January 1945. Subsequently appointed Consul General at Chicago, USA, in October 1947, before his last appointment as Consul General in Paris between March 1950 and 31st December 1953. From 1949 to 1950 he served as Lieutenant and Quartermaster to the 1st Battalion, Hampshire Regiment, and having been promoted to Captain, then saw service in Malaya during the Malayan Emergency as a Camp Commandant of the HQ Singapore Base District during 1953, and then with the Headquarters Staff of the 1st Battalion, Hampshire Regiment during 1956 to 1957, being promoted to Major on 20th December 1956. "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty, for the extremely high merit of his work in reconnaissance and as a Artillery Officer, for constant display of initiative and resource and for continuously setting a fine example of keenness and resolve". In particular on the following occasions – 7 dates listed with details, one here for example "On 11. April 1918 When he led an Offensive Patrol under extremely bad weather conditions, it being impossible to fly above 300 feet. After obtaining some valuable information, in his R.E.8. he was shot down in the lines near ARMENTIERES but was instrumental in conveying valuable information to Brigade H.Q. from the Battalion Commander. After this, he went under fire to a hostile machine which was crashed and brought back the German signals for communication between aircraft, Artillery and Infantry. I have to add that on many occasions the C.B.S.O. and the S.O.R.A. have expressed their high appreciation of this Officer's distinguished services in co-operation with Artillery". Bar to M.C. London Gazette 26 July 1918 "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty, both in reconnaissance and as a Artillery Observer. On one occasion, although shot down, he brought in valuable information. On several occasions, he conducted several knock-out shoots with various batteries, obtained excellent photographs and did much good work of a very high standard". Another recommendation for 'award' was sent in on 30 September 1918 for his September work – no award received. Distinguished Flying Cross: Original recommendation for an immediate award of the Distinguished Service Order for continuous gallantry and skill when flying in active operations against the enemy, in Counter Battery work, Photography and Reconnaissance. In addition to his excellent work in the air this Officer has performed all his duties on the ground in a highly efficient and painstaking manner. Through his exertions all the Officers in his flight obtained a high standard of training. I would draw attention to the excellent performance of this Officer on 16/5/1918. 18 dates listed with details, one here for example 16 May 1918 Photography, 15 plates exposed over Corps Counter Battery Area. In the middle of this flight he was attacked by 12 enemy scouts. His Observers gun jammed and they were driven down to 2000 feet, but by extremely skilful handling of his machine, Captain GLENNY avoided serious damage. After the scouts had been driven off, he returned immediately and carried on with the shoot. The Army Commander sent a special message of congratulations through 2nd Brigade for this performance which was witnessed and reported to him by several people on the ground. The whole fight lasted 4 hours 20 mins. D.F.C. London Gazette 3.12.1918 (France) "This Officer has rendered valuable and gallant service on many occasions when on photographic and other reconnaissance's. On 16th May, when directing fire on a hostile battery, he was attacked by twelve hostile scouts; his Observer's gun jammed and he was driven down to 2,000 feet, but handling his machine with great skill, he avoided serious damage' after the scouts had been driven off he returned and carried on the shoot with successful results. In this flight which lasted four hours, he succeeded in taking fifteen photographs over corps counter battery area". Belgian Croix de Guerre London Gazette 15 July 1919. Original recommendation for award with this citation Flight Commander, 'M' Flight. "This Officer was placed in charge of 'M' Flight on formation on 6.10.1918 a few days before the battle started. He showed the greatest energy and keenness in commanding this Flight and I consider it is largely due to his efforts that the Flight carried on without machine and engine troubles as is not the case with the other Bristol Flights. He has maintained the right offensive spirit in his flight and all his Officers show the greatest energy and dispatch in their work" dated 11.11.1918. Mentioned in Despatches London Gazette 25. October 1940 Royal Air Force. Air Commodore, M.C., D.F.C. (now retired) Mentioned in Despatches London Gazette 20 June 1941 Royal Air Force. Air Commodore, M.C., D.F.C. Arthur Willoughby Falls Glenny. Born 2 March 1897, lived in Newry, Co Down, Ireland. Gazetted 2.Lieutenant in the Army Service Corps. In 1915. Seconded to the R.F.C. as an Observer with 5 Squadron October 1915-May 1916. On 19 December 1915 Glenny with his Pilot (2/Lieut. Cooper) in their BE2c 4501 on Counter Battery Work were attacked over Elverdinghe by a Fokker and two or three Aviatiks: Combat Report "Several hostile machines appeared coming from the South at a great altitude. I kept them in sight until they manoeuvred so as to get between us and the sun, which was very strong. I was unable to locate them again until they opened fire at close range, and I immediately turned sharply to engage the one on my left hand side. My Observer was trying to cover the machine on the right hand side which had turned and overtaken us. Both machines which I think were Aviatik's (or L.V.G.'s) were very much faster than ours. In trying to manoeuvre for a shot my machine "side slipped" and nose dived. Almost before we recovered the enemy were firing on us again, and there appeared to be two machines, above and below us. I dived on one but my gun for some reason would not fire, so I turned to give my Observer a chance. At that moment our top petrol tank was pierced and we were forced to land. We were then about 8,000feet up, and able to reach the aerodrome". Lieutenant 2 February 1916. Trained as a Pilot, Royal Aero Club Aviators Certificate (No. 3205) 1 July 1916 qualifying for his 'Wings' 4 August 1916. Sent to the Home Defence as a Pilot in 50 Squadron stationed at Dover flying a BE2c (Pilot only to save weight for height needed to reach Zepps.) on 23/24 September 1916 (night) against 12 Navy Zeppelins against London. Then 52 squadron in France November 1916-May 1917, on to 9 Squadron as A/Captain May 1917-August 1917, then with R.E.8 equipped 7 Squadron as A/Captain, Flight Commander January 1918 - October 1918, then 'M' Squadron October 1918-March 1919. A Permanent Commission followed Captain 1 August 1919 in the R.A.F. after the Great War and between the Wars served in 20**

Wilfred Henry Dunn, D.S.C. Bar to D.S.C. Lon. Gaz. 17.5.1918 - Services in Mesopotamia: "For conspicuous courage and skill in carrying out an extraordinary amount of flying, both in sea and land planes. He is invariably cheerful and ready when called on for work". Mention in Despatches Lon. Gaz. 1.1.1941 Group Captain, R.A.F. Wilfrid Henry Dunn born 19.9.1893, qualified Third Officer in the British India Company 1914. Prob. Flight Sub. Lieut., R.N.A.S. Jan. 1915, qualified for his "Wings" and R.A.E.C. Aviator's Certificate 11.3.1915 served as a Pilot on H.M.S. Empress, engine failure, force landed on sands at Bembridge (Isle of Wight) - stranded 4.7.1915 in his Farman Seaplane, then posted in Sept. 1915 to the Mesopotamia Theatre; Force 'D' R.N.A.S. employed in operations to relieve the siege of KUT. Crashed his Type 827 Seaplane at Orah, 10 miles South of Kut 14.2.1916 and in April 1916, a hard-pressed force of 4 B.E.2c's, 2 Naval Farmans and 3 Short Seaplanes, dropped 19,000 pounds of food in two weeks to the besieged garrison at KUT, comprising of 140 flights - Lewis guns and ammunition were removed with medical supplies and food stowed in their place, but the pilot still had his revolver ! A constant worry for Dunn, for German aircraft did their best to interfere in the first ever attempt to keep troops supplied by air. In these Kut food drops he wrecked one Voisin 10.4.1916, and another landing UNDER telegraph wires, removing the undercarriage on 5.5.1916 His 'conspicuous courage' was duly recognised by a Bar to his D.S.C. In Dec. 1916. Transferred to 8 Squadron R.N.A.S. East Africa Theatre of operations, flew from Lindi for co-operation with the Army, until some Voisin aircraft at Zanzibar could be resurrected, a single seaplane operated out of the local harbour, for recon. & bombing sorties. The official record of No. 8 Seaplane Sqd. (R.N.A.S.) states: 'Two Voisin machines arrived at Lindi in June and proceeded to carry out an extensive series of photographic flights from the results of which the first accurate maps of this part of the country were made. Lindi, a difficult place to work from, was unhealthy with a non satisfactory aerodrome, but Flight Lieut's Dunn work was very valuable. In Aug. the enemy, still in the vicinity were forced to retire by our troops supported by a preliminary bombardment by the two Monitors, who flooded their ballast tanks and managed to get the necessary elevation, while the R.N.A.S. carried out the spotting Lindi aerodrome was abandoned on 12 Oct. moving to Mtwā, the planes co-operated with the troops over a 3 day engagement driving the enemy out of a very strongly fortified position in Makiwa. This engagement was the heaviest of the campaign and after the enemy had been forced to continue their retreat, the R.N.A.S. machines were employed in low flying in search of water holes for the supply of our troops ' Had engine failure on take off, turned to avoid a hanger, port wing hit ground, wrecked, Dar-es-Salaam 27.11.1916. Moved to Zanzibar, the R.N.A.S. detachment returned to the U.K. in Jan. 1918, although Dunn and another pilot left behind 'in case of eventualities'. Advanced to Flight Cdr. in June 1917, joined 67 Wing in the Adriatic, a Flight Lieut. in the new R.A.F. 1.4.1918. Joined the Aircraft Depot, India Group in Dec. 1919, and in Oct. 1920 as a Flight Cdr. in 5 Squadron flying Bristol Fighters on the North West Frontier of India & in the Waziristan operations of 1921-24, Flight Cdr. 16 Sqd. 1925 and 4 Sqd. on Bristol Fighters in 1929 H.M.S. Vindictive and 1930s C.O. of the Fleet Air Arm element in the aircraft carrier H.M.S. Glorious. C.O. 230 Sqd. No. 81 Operational Training Group, Fighter Command from July 1942, Dunn became S.A.S.O., Air Defences, Eastern Med. setting up his H.Q. in Cyprus he & his staff to oversee fighter operations. In Mch. 1944, appointed A.O.C. 210 Group, Med. Allied Coastal Air Force, later in 1944 Retired as an Air Commodore. Having transferred to the Royal Air Force in its formation in April 1918, Maund was posted to Greece in May 1918 from where he undertook bombing raids, operating from bases at Thasos, Imbros, and Mudros. On 9 June 1918, following a raid to Kukli Burgas, the D.H.4 aircraft piloted by Lt Colt, force landed into the sea and both men were picked up by Greek fishermen. On 27th August 1918, again in a D.H.4 aircraft, this time piloted by Lieutenant Haughton, he bombed the seaplane base at Constantinople. Having successfully put a bomb in each of the three hangers, Maund climbed out of the aircraft to ascertain direct hits which earned him the nickname "Mad Monty Maund". On his return to civilian life he drove a milk lorry from Devonshire to London during the General Strike of 1926, and shortly after his marriage left for America where his first employment was as a chauffeur to the minister at the famous "Little Church around the Corner" in New York City. Later he rented space in a workshop for car repair and maintenance where some of his clients were prohibition mobsters. Following the Wall Street crash, Maund returned to the U.K. in 1930 and set up a garage in Goodmayes, Essex. WW2 resulted in him losing his business and in 1944 he was recruited as a transport officer in the R.N.V.R. which included organising the transportation of the Mulberry Harbour in preparation for the D-Day invasion. After being demobilised he joined the Control Commission in Germany where he was responsible for transport in Northern Germany and was billeted in the Krupp's private mansion. Latterly until his retirement, Maund worked as a specialist engineer in the Woolwich Arsenal, concentrating mainly on naval guns and advanced experimental torpedoes. He died on 23rd November 1988. The H.A. dived at the F.E. from behind passing down in front of F.E. The F.E. dived, shooting 4 drums from 2 guns from the Dixon-Spain fixed mounting. The H.A. then dived absolutely vertically, turned over and was seen to crash on the ground, S.E. of Roulers between Ouchene and Rumbek.' 'On 10/11/16, when over Menin, the pilot 2/Lt. R. W. Reid, sighted a H.A. diving at him from the right front. He at once turned half right and drove up at the H.A., intending his Observer, 1/A.M. Alexander, to open fire with front gun. The Observer however, had seen a H.A. diving from left front and when the pilot turned half right he thought it was to bring rear gun to bear on left hand H.A. The right hand H.A. misjudged his dive, passed overhead, and was not seen again. The Observer while getting up to fire rear gun was hit by a bullet in the right arm, rendering it useless. However, he managed to fire with his left arm only when the H.A. now just behind, shot the Lewis Gun out of action and again hit the Observer in the side. The Pilot then swerved away and, the H.A., ceasing to attack, he escaped over the lines to Bailleul.' 409. **A rare Great War English Channel 24th April 1917 H12 Flying Boat Observer's Submarine Attack single Distinguished Service Medal awarded to Air Mechanic 2nd Class C.S. Laycock, Royal Naval Air Service later Royal Air Force, who was the observer in Lieutenant Commander F.C. Waugh's attack on a U-Boat which had attacked an Italian ship off Portland Bill. Distinguished Service Medal**, Geo V, bust; to F.10364 C.S. Laycock, Air Mechanic 2nd Class Royal Naval Air Service, 'English Channel 26 Apr 1917'. Charles Stanley Laycock was born in Harrogate, Yorkshire on 21st July 1898, and having worked as an iron worker, with the ongoing Great War, he then enlisted into the Royal Naval Air Service as a Boy Mechanic (F.10364) with President II on 3rd January 1916, before being posted to the RNAS base - H.M.S Daedalus on 1st June 1916, and rated as an Air Mechanic 2nd Class on 21st September 1916. Posted back to President on 1st December 1916, he was then posted to the flying boat base at Calshot on 2nd December 1916. Here Laycock joined the crew of a H12 flying boat, and operated on patrols over the English Channel, patrolling the mid channel area on anti U-Boat patrols. As one account states - on the morning of 24th April 1917 (impressed as the 26th April 1917 on the medal) an S.O.S was received from an Italian ship saying she was under attack from a U-Boat south of Portland Bill. Surface craft and seaplanes were immediately sent out, and the flying boat with Laycock on board, which had landed at Portland the previous day with minor engine trouble, also went away to search the area. The flying boat's crew found the U-Boat on the surface and, probably because the morning was misty, approached within a quarter of a mile before the submarine commander became aware of the danger which threatened him. He then prepared to dive, but while his conning tower was still awash, two bombs of 100 lb weight, dropped from the flying boat, exploded above the submarine. Oil and bubbles came to the surface and, after a further uneventful patrol in the vicinity, the flying boat's crew returned to their base reasonably confident that they had destroyed or disabled the U-Boat. About an hour later, however, a destroyer saw the submarine breaking surface again near where she had last been seen and attacked. The destroyer dashed towards her, but she had submerged before the British vessel reached her. Judging the position of the target from her wash, the crew of the destroyer dropped two depth charges and, following the explosions, oil gushed to the surface and spread over a large area. Patrols were maintained throughout the day and a hydrophone watch kept during the night. Late in the evening, a motor noise heard in the hydrophone of one of the destroyers seemed to imply that the U-Boat had got under way again, but the Admiralty, weighing all the evidence, decided that the U-Boat had been destroyed. She may have been the U.B.39 which sailed on April the 23rd, but never returned. The pilots patrol report, written on 24th April 1917 by Lieutenant Commander F.C. Waugh, confirms that Laycock was in fact the observer in the H12 seaplane during the bombing attack on the U-Boat conducted on the 24th April 1917. For his distinguished service in this action, whilst part of the crew of the H12 flying boat engaged with the U Boat on 26th April 1917, Laycock was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal in the London Gazette for 22nd June 1917, with an image of him appearing in a local paper. Laycock who is further mentioned in another patrol report by his pilot, Lieutenant Commander F.C. Waugh, in another patrol conducted on 23rd September 1917 in which another attack was conducted on a U-Boat, was posted to the flying boat base at Portland on 16th October 1917, and qualified as an Electrical Mechanic on 1st November 1917, being then posted to Verve Wireless Station on 7th November 1917, followed by returning to the books of Daedalus and being posted to the flying boat station at Portsmouth on 1st January 1918 where he was located on the transfer of his unit into the Royal Air Force on its creation on 1st April 1918, and saw further service in flying boats for the remainder of the war.
